LENTEN REGULATIONS

Everyone between the ages of 14 and 60 is bound to:

• Abstain from meat (no meat allowed) on Ash Wednesday, all Fridays in Lent, and Good Friday.

• Fasting -- one full, meatless meal on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Two other meatless meals may be taken, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids are allowed.

• No one should dispense from these practices except for grave reasons, such as health, and some other penitential practice (such as praying a rosary, reading Scripture, or abstaining from television) should be substituted.

Dear Brother Knights, Friends and Family Members,

During this year's MD State Council Mid-Term meeting of Grand Knights, Deputy Grand Knights and District Deputies on January 11, we were told that the Order was initiating a new "Exemplification of Charity, Unity and Fraternity" that would re-

William Newbrough, DD place the three ceremonial exemplifications we have known over the years. As one who has enjoyed the solemnity and beauty of our degrees as a candidate, a spectator, a degree team member and now as District Deputy, I was initially shocked and saddened by the news. Our degrees have served to build and strengthen our Order over its long history. But it's important to remember that our degrees do not exist for ceremony sake alone. And in fact they have changed significantly over the years – especially the 3rd degree. On the contrary, our degrees were designed to welcome, educate and edify our new members while strengthening and inspiring our Brother Knights in their charitable works and fraternal mission.

It's important to look to the example of our founder Fr. Michael McGivney, especially at this moment of significant change. During the inaugural years of the Order, Fr. McGivney was instrumental in designing the two degrees that were used to initiate and form new members -- the Degrees of Charity and Unity. Later, the Order would add the 3rd Degree of Fraternity followed by the creation of the 4th Degree of Patriotism. Each of these ceremonies in its time was intended to maximize the growth of the Order, protect Catholic families and welcome Catholic men into an organization that did not separate faith from daily life lived in the public square. Fr. McGivney resisted every effort that might do so, stating that he did not want Catholic men to join secret societies that banned religious discourse from their fraternal activities. In short, he wanted his Knights to be complete, well-formed Catholic gentlemen whose faith was evident in the lives they lived. Faith and Family were and continue to be the foundation on which the Knights of Columbus exist and thrive.

Over the years, many changes have occurred in our ceremonials most dramatically in the creation of the "new" Knighthood 3rd Degree about eight years ago. But again, the principles of the Order remain unchanged. Even in Fr. McGivney's lifetime, there were ceremonial changes. Following one such change, Fr. McGivney was quoted as saying, "Our Order is the same as when first instituted." The most recent changes combine the lessons of Charity, Unity and Fraternity into a single exemplification that is open to the public. The degree is intended to be held in a council's home parish and a chaplain (priest or deacon) should be present if possible. The Exemplification of Charity, Unity and Fraternity is open to our families, friends and fellow parishioners. In this degree, as stated by our Supreme Knight Carl Anderson, we seek to "extend the hand of brotherhood to good men, who want to become better men so that together we may become great men."

The new ceremony remains true to our traditions while addressing the needs of today's fast paced life style. Time constraints and the requirement of secrecy have been identified as the two primary obstacles to joining our Order. The new degree is more accessible while remaining true to the principles that have shaped and built the Order since its founding in 1882. In many ways, the simplified ceremony harkens back to the simpler ceremonies of Charity and Unity first designed by Fr. McGivney. Most importantly, our families will be able to see firsthand the organization that their fathers, sons, brothers and friends are joining as they commit to the principles of Charity, Unity and Fraternity. This aspect of including the family in the ceremonial welcome of the new members is completely in line with Fr. McGivney's desire to see Catholic men live their faith fully within the context of their daily lives.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all members of the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Degree teams whose dedication and commitment to the ceremonials of our Order has been such a gift to their brother knights. Their commitment to excellence in performing their roles has welcomed and formed generations of new members of our Order. They have inspired, educated and motivated countless brother knights to perform innumerable acts of charity in Christ's Holy Name. Personally, I cannot begin to list the number of occasions in which a lousy day has turned around to become a truly blessed evening by attending a wellexecuted Admission, Formation or Knighthood Degree. I am so grateful for the many inspiring exemplifications I have attended in my years as a Knight. And I would like to invite those who have served on degree teams to consider taking a speaking role in the new Exemplification of Charity, Unity and Fraternity.

As of March 1st 2020, councils which have fully prepared for the new exemplification and have all the necessary ceremonial items and arrangements will be authorized to host the new degree. In the words of our Supreme Knight, "The Knights of Columbus need the men of today just as the men of today need the Knights of Columbus." And indeed, today the Church needs us now more than ever. Let us honor the traditions of our past while moving forward boldly with generous hearts, ever ready to safeguard our families while putting our faith into action.

May Our Lady Queen of the Knights guide and protect our every step! *Vivat Jesus!*

Why the Knights are Changing the Degree Ceremonies

The Knights of Columbus has announced a major revision to its longtime initiation ceremonies and for the first time will open them to the public, saying the changes are needed to become more appealing to prospective members and to respond to a "crisis" in church membership.

"Today, we need an exemplification of our principles that presents, in a clear and convincing way, how charity, unity and fraternity can come together to form a Catholic way of life for today's man and his family," Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson said in the January 2020 issue of Columbia magazine.

The rituals of the Knights, sometimes called ceremonies or exemplifications, have for decades been separated into first, second and third degrees focused respectively on the principles of Charity, Unity and Fraternity, the first three principles of the Catholic men's fraternity founded in Connecticut in 1882 by Father Michael J. McGivney.

The Knights of Columbus now claim about 1.9 million members in 15,900 local councils in the U.S., Canada, Mexico, Poland, Ukraine, South Korea and several other countries.

Usually when new members joined the knights, councils would run a first degree initiation ceremony for them or take them to a nearby council with a trained degree team. New members would be encouraged to go through their second and third degree ceremonies at a later date.

These ceremonials of the order were kept under a pledge of secrecy limited to the membership.

The new ceremony will now combine all three degrees and, in another major change, will be opened to the public. Anderson said the exemplification may be conducted in a council's meeting chamber or in a church, "with families and friends seated in the pews."

"They will see firsthand the organization that their husbands, fathers, brothers, sons and friends are joining the principles and values they are committing to and why it matters," Anderson said in remarks he originally delivered Nov. 23 to the Knights of Columbus midyear organizational meeting of state deputies in Orlando, Florida.

"This historic new ceremonial is rooted in our past and tailored to our present. It will inspire more men to join us," Anderson said. "Most of all, it is essential to the sustainability of the Knights of Columbus, as it will empower us to advance our mission and grow in the years ahead. It is essential to our ability to meet the crisis we now face."

Anderson's remarks acknowledged that more than 26 million Catholics have left the faith in the United States and millions more in Canada. Baptisms have fallen by 40%, sacramental marriages have fallen by more than 66% and only just over 20% of Catholics attend Mass regularly.

Four in ten baptized Catholics no longer identify as Catholic, and for the first time self-identified Catholics no longer make up a majority of Hispanics, according to a 2019 survey.

"This is a crisis for our Church. This is a crisis for our Catholic families," Anderson said, adding "this is a crisis for our order."

"You know as well as I do that we are finding it harder to recruit men — especially younger men," he told the Knights' state deputies. "And while many jurisdictions are still adding members and inspiring more good works, in other jurisdictions this is no longer the case."

Anderson cited the difficulties of bringing young men, especially young fathers, into the order. Many said they found it difficult to attend multiple ceremonies.

"They also tell us that secrecy is unnecessary, and sometimes, it is even an impediment to joining," Anderson added. He cited a lack of manpower in local councils to perform degree ceremonies. Some candidates give up, and some never seek second and third degrees.

"Last year, little more than half of the men who took their First Degree also took their Third Degree," he said, adding that the number of third degree teams is expected to decline.

He said the current system is "too often a stumbling block, not a gateway to membership" that often fails to promote "a truly Catholic fraternal membership according to the vision of Father McGivney."

"Our ceremonials have always been an essential way we teach the principles of charity, unity and fraternity. But today, too many men never hear the lessons of unity and fraternity," he said, adding that the failure to reach members "threatens the future of our order."

Anderson said the crisis facing the Church is fundamentally "a failure to evangelize."

"Such a crisis cannot be adequately responded to without the action of Catholic husbands and fathers," he said.

The Knights' membership process already changed in recent years when the order began to allow online membership. Online members had the right to attend any council business meeting and could purchase Knights of Columbus insurance, but they lacked the ordinary rights of council members until they officially enrolled in a council and underwent a first degree ceremony.

The 2019 Supreme Convention of the Knights of Columbus adopted a resolution to consider combining the first three degrees and removing the condition of secrecy.

Anderson said he directed a review of the ceremonials "with an eye toward staying true to our roots while at the same time presenting our principles of charity, unity and

fraternity in a more clear and convincing way." The process involved consultation with supreme directors, state officers, and longtime members experienced in ceremonials.

"The result is a new ceremony that stays true to our traditions while addressing the needs of our times," he said.

Anderson placed the order's longtime rituals in the context of the 19th century, when the Knights of Columbus competed with many other fraternal societies. Men of the time "wanted secrecy and the sense of progression that came with multiple degrees," he said.

These fraternal ceremonies presented a "journey through knighthood" to encourage greater participation in the order and to inspire men to seek leadership roles in local councils. Anderson said these ceremonies worked well for such purposes in the past, but do not work today. He professed a "special fondness" for the old ceremonies, but he noted that Fr. McGivney himself needed to make changes in the 1880s to help the order grow.

Citing Pope Benedict XVI's description of McGivney as representing "the secret of the impressive growth" of the Catholic Church in America, Anderson said McGivney is still an inspiring example for millions and the Knights of Columbus continue to pray for his canonization.

"For Father McGivney, the path of charity, unity and fraternity was to be an enduring path of Christian discipleship," said Anderson, who said this was entrusted to laymen under the guidance of clergy "to direct and carry out their own part in the mission of the Church."

Anderson prayed that McGivney's intercession "guide, sustain and enable us to fulfill our vocation as leaders of this great Order for the welfare of our brother Knights and the renewal of our Church."

REFLECTIONS Lawrence P. Grayson, PGK **Crisis, Hope, and the Lenten Season**

"[T]he Church is currently experiencing one of the greatest crises she has ever known," declared Cardinal Raymond Burke last October. This assessment was recently affirmed by Pope-Emeritus Benedict XVI who described the current situation as "the lasting crisis that the priesthood has been going through for many years."

In the introduction to their soon-to-be-released book, *From the Depths of Our Hearts: Priesthood, Celibacy, and the Crisis of the Catholic Church*, the Pope-Emeritus and Cardinal Robert Sarah wrote: "The priesthood is going through a dark time. Wounded by the revelation of so many scandals, disconcerted by the constant questioning of their consecrated celibacy, many priests are tempted by the thought of giving up and abandoning everything." Priests are questioning their vocations at a time when they are needed most to catechize and lead their congregations in the faith.


fession in cases of child abuse.

At a time when the voice of the Catholic Church is needed greatly to meet these external threats, it has been effectively silenced by internal scandals that never cease to shock: sexual abuses of minors and seminarians, hierarchical cover ups, misuse of church funds, disputes among bishops and among cardinals over long-settled dogma, including married clergy, priestly celibacy, ordination of women, and Communion to divorced and civilly remarried Catholics, non-Catholics, and pro-abortion politicians. The result is a laity that is largely confused and discouraged, and either obeying only those elements of the faith that meet their liking or leaving the Church entirely.

As Pope Paul VI warned almost 50 years ago, the "smoke of Satan" has seeped into the Church.

The Church is being besieged throughout the world, externally and internally, politically and culturally. And what is true for the universal Church is equally true for the Church in America.

This country is evolving into a secularist, anything goes society, becoming anti-religious and threatening the ability of people to live their



faith in the public square. A host of laws, regulations and judicial rulings are allowing homosexuality, assisted suicide, gay marriage, abortion, pornography, prostitution, self-selected sexual identity and transgender behavior to spread throughout the nation. The advocates for these positions are clamoring not only for acceptance, but for special protected rights to acclaim their behavior and force others to adhere to their values or face legal penalties and social sanctions.

The cumulative effect is staggering. Christian bakers, photographers, printers, owners of celebratory venues, nurses, physicians, pharmacists, and others are being threatened with civil and workplace penalties if they do not use their skills to celebrate and memorialize activities that violate their religious consciences. Even the Little Sisters of the Poor have been forced to seek relief for a third time from the U.S. Supreme Court to exempt them from a government mandate to provide their employees with health insurance that covers abortion-inducing drugs. And, although the bill was withdrawn before becoming law, the California state senate overwhelmingly approved a bill to force priests to violate the seal of Con-



In spite of the moral darkness, there is hope. There are many strong religious elements that can foster a resurgence of the Catholic faith. There are new religious orders with an increasing number of seminarians and postulants. There is a vibrant and expanding lay, Catholic media. There are newlyestablished colleges that are committed to devel-

oping strong Catholic identities.

In addition to organizational strengths, there are the youth. On the day of his installation as pope, St. John Paul II said to the young people gathered in St. Peter's Square: "you are the hope of the Church and of the world." A commitment to the youth was a continuing theme throughout his ministry for he saw the young searching for the meaning of life and for ways to lead their lives. The youth, he perceived, are searching for God.

This papal-saint was right. Millennials. those born in the period 1981-2000, have already shown that they are a Pro-Life Generation. From among their ranks are many of today's pro-life activists, disturbing the consciences of their elders, bringing the atrocities of abortion into public view, and expanding their numbers through outreach efforts in schools, colleges and universities. They are changing society. Public attitudes are shifting. Pro-life advocacy is increasing. Pro-abortion support is declining. The annual number of abortions is now the lowest it has been since abortion was legalized in 1973.

Physician Assisted Suicide

Last year, Maryland lawmakers rejected a bill to legalize physician-assisted suicide (PAS) for the fourth time. Yet, advocates are expected to reintroduce the legislation in this session. Regardless of what the bill looks like, PAS will be a risk to the elderly, people with intellectual and developmental disabilities, and others.

No safeguards can truly protect against coercion and abuse of vulnerable individuals. Nor can doctors accurately predict that an illness will be terminal in 6-months. And there is evidence in states where PAS is legal that insurance companies are already declining coverage of life-extending treatments and instead approving coverage for cheaper drug overdoses that end a patient's life.

Governor Larry Hogan has indicated that he is open to possibly signing a PAS bill if it comes to his desk. A growing coalition of local bipartisan opposition to PAS will oppose this legislation. Will you?

Passionate, Catholic, young adults and young converts are evangelizing on college campuses, street corners and other public venues. And there are many young families who are living their faith daily – praying, engaging in charitable works, and instilling in their children the habits of a Catholic life.

The latest generational cohort, born after 2000, appears to be equally committed to pro-life. Referred to as the iGeneration, the first pictures for many were taken via ultrasound in the womb, presenting them with the undeniable humanity of the unborn. As a positive indicator of the future, teenage pregnancies, births and abortion rates are at all-time lows and decreasing.

While there is reason for hope, a spiritual crisis – a satanic battle -- cannot be overcome solely with material approaches. It requires our actions to be aligned with the Will of God, so that He can act through us. The path forward requires a concerted effort by all Catholics, clerical and lay, to live the faith they profess. A reformation can start now in Lent by making it not only a period of spiritual preparation for celebrating the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Our Lord, but of repentance and renewal of the Church.

Let us begin by doing something each day to contribute to a resurgence of the faith – say the rosary, spend some time each week in Eucharistic Adoration, abstain from meat on Fridays, go to Confession, attend Mass more frequently, meditate on the liturgical readings through which the penitential spirit of the season is exemplified.

If we do, the results will be profound. As Pope St. John Paul II reminded us, "The power of Christ's Cross and Resurrection is greater than any evil...[Our Lord's] demands never exceed man's abilities. If man accepts these demands with an attitude of faith, he will also find in the grace that God never fails to give him the necessary strength to meet those demands." When we pray and do our best to meet the Lord's expectations, the world *will* be a different place.

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
