Worthy Brothers,

The start of a new Fraternal Year begins with the first of July. First off, a tremendous Thank you, from the State Council, to the Council Officers who now have completed their terms and responsibilities of the past Fraternal Year. A lot was accomplishes in the last 12 months and a few surprises were encountered as the

Fraternal Year closed out. Congratulations to the new Council Officers as you adjust to your new positions and ramp up your planning for the new fraternal year. Obviously no one last year at this time dreamed that we would now be in the middle of a pandemic and social strife, but as everyone keeps saying; "Welcome to the New Normal".

I would caution that there is nothing normal about "This Normal". Just as "The Normal" temperatures during the winter would usually be in the 20s and 30s, while "The Normal" temperatures during summer are in the 80s and 90s, we need to adjust our response to different environmental Normals.

At the State Leadership Seminar conducted this past weekend (6/26-27/2020) we witnessed presentations from the Officers from the State Council, occasionally supplemented with presentations from Supreme Officers. The messages were positive and constructive. The Order is healthy, active and is adjusting to the current normal, as well as preparing for the new normal that we hope to return to soon.

At the Supreme level, our numbers have continued to grow, the number of brothers worldwide have eclipsed two million. At this time most Councils are forced to meet virtually and as a result; Online Exemplifications have

been made available by Supreme. Once we begin to meet face to face again, Councils will finally be able to implement the new Exemplification Ceremony, designed to adjust to a new community of candidates. In response to current financial challenges encountered by local Councils, their community and their members, Supreme has suspended the membership per Capita assessment for the coming fraternal year. Supreme has implemented a number of programs in response to COVID-19, specifically "Leave No Neighbor Behind". I would recommend you visit the Supreme Website, www.kofc.org for specific details.

At the State level, the Council continues to be active and proactive, in the current "Normal". The back cover of the June issue of the Columbian magazine documents the then, current State Deputy, Dale Trott, personally delivering supplies to the Little Sisters of the Poor in Catonsville, MD. Councils in our own District (#5567, St Manyanet) have participated to the effort. At the June 2020 State Leadership Seminar, Officers and Directors of the new fraternal year administration were introduced. All positions are filled and presentations from each of the Chairs were given. Adjustments to several State programs were announced, including announcing both the Tootsie Roll and Car Raffle Programs are being pushed out to the spring timeframe. For the benefit of the Council administration, a number of the reporting requirements have been simplified and sometimes scaled back.

So given the new "Normal", the Order is ready and able. Gentlemen – Best of Luck in the new Fraternal Year and in the New Normal and pray that a Normal "Normal" returns soon.

Who Needs Long-Term Care Insurance?

- 2. Contrary to popular belief, neither Medicare, VA, nor conventional health insurance will pay for LTC. Medicaid is the only government program that will pay for LTC, but you must be *impoverished* to qualify for benefits;
- 3. Being a caregiver to an impaired individual is a grueling job one that can destroy the health, career and family of the caregiver(s) who most often (80%) are uncompensated female members of the family;
- 4. To protect the savings/assets of the impaired individual which would have to be spent down to near zero before Medicaid assistance becomes available (i.e., to avoid

Are You Willing to Go Into the Breach?

A few years ago, Bishop Thomas J. Olmsted of Phoenix published an Apostolic Exhortation to the men of his diocese, entitled *Into the Breach*. In explaining the need for it, he wrote:

"Men, do not hesitate to engage in the battle that is raging around you, the battle that is wounding our children and families, the battle that is distorting the dignity of both women and men. This battle is often hidden, but the battle is real. It is primarily spiritual, but it is progressively killing the remaining Christian ethos in our society and culture, and even in our own homes.

The world is under attack by Satan, as our Lord said it would be (1 Peter 5:8-14). This battle is occurring in the Church herself, and the devastation is all too evident...

One of the key reasons that the Church is faltering under the attacks of Satan is that many Catholic men have not been willing to "step into the breach"...A large number have left the faith, and many who remain "Catholic" practice the faith timidly and are only minimally committed to passing the faith on to their children...

As our fathers, brothers, uncles, sons and friends fall away from the Church, they fall deeper and deeper into sin, breaking their bonds with God and leaving them vulnerable to the fires of Hell. While we know that Christ welcomes back every repentant sinner, the truth is that large numbers of Catholic men are failing to keep the promises they made at their children's baptisms – promises to bring them to Christ and to raise them in the faith of the Church."

Inspired by the Exhortation, the Knights of Columbus produced a video series which seeks to answer the question of *what it means to be a man and how to live as a man in today's world.* In addition, Supreme developed a study guide, coupled it with the Exhortation, and published the two as a booklet in the Domestic Church series, published by the Catholic Information Service; it can be downloaded at

The 12 videos in the series cover the following topics:

Masculinity — The Church is facing a "man crisis." Men are made for greatness. "Authentic masculinity" means to live for excellence. Mike Phelan explains how he discovered the nature of true masculinity and how to live it.

Brotherhood — Man was not meant to "go it alone," but to be in communion with others. It is important to build close friendships with other men of faith. Master Sergeant Sompaul Vorapanich shares lessons on the importance of brotherhood.

Leadership — Men must become leaders through devel-

oping their character. True leadership seeks greatness and brings out greatness in others. Robert Yates discusses his service in the Air Force and highlights the importance of being servant leaders.

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Fatherhood — The presence and involvement of a loving father is critical in the development of a child. True fatherhood models itself on God the Father. Former MLB player Mike Sweeney shares how the faith of a man should shape his role as a father.

Family — There is a "battle for the very soul of the family." Men's service of their families requires sacrifice. Greg and Julie Alexander explain how discovering the true nature of marriage transformed their relationship and their family.

Life — Human life is sacred. Men have a responsibility to protect society's most vulnerable. Men's participation in the pro-life movement is vital. John Morales shares his story of regret, healing and hope as a testimony to the importance of life.

Prayer — Prayer must be a priority in the life of a man. Eucharistic adoration, reading scripture and saying the rosary are central to prayer. Robert Feeney tells his story of the power of prayer on the battlefield in Vietnam and life in general.

Suffering — Suffering is a mystery which can bring us closer to God and help us grow in holiness. The answer to suffering is Jesus Christ. Frank Ramirez shares his story of responding to intense suffering by worshiping God.

Sacramental Life — Christ offers his grace through the sacraments. The Eucharist and Confession need to be central to every man's life. Jared Zimmerer explores how his experience as a bodybuilder helps him understand aspects of the sacramental life.

Spiritual Warfare — The life of a believer is a spiritual battle. Men have multiple spiritual weapons in the fight against Satan, and the stakes are high. Don O'Mara recounts his experience with abuse and addiction and finding forgiveness and freedom in Christ.

Evangelization — All Christians are called to be witnesses of their faith to others. To share the faith a man must know the faith. Ryan Young shares how his Eucharistic-centered camp for teenagers allows for an encounter with Christ.

The Cornerstone — Christ is the only sure foundation of a man's life. We are to know, love and serve God, so we can be with him forever. Actor Clarence Gilyard Jr. shares his testimony of straying from God's plan and how God led him to enter the Catholic Church.

Thoughts for the Fourth of July

The Fourth of July is typically a day of joyous festivities celebrating America's birth as a nation. And so it should be. Today, however, the country is experiencing spirit-wrenching events. The nation has undergone several months of lockdown and restrictions on the freedoms of assembly and religion due to a viral pandemic. Riots have occurred in cities across the country sparked by the egregious death of a black man by an overly combative policeman. Abortion continues to be a nationally divisive issue, with roughly half of the population approving of it and half protesting it, more than 47 years after it was legalized by the Supreme Court. These are not simply the results of disagreements over public policy. Rather, they indicate fundamental differences in the worldview through

which the founding values of this country are interpreted – or ignored. On this Independence Day, take a moment to reread, or perhaps read, the Declaration of Independence. Think about what it says and what it implies.

After a brief statement of purpose, the Declaration states, "that all men are created equal, that they are en-

dowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." This nation was established by people of faith, founded on a belief in a sovereign God who reigns over nations as well as men, who endows each individual with certain innate entitlements.

This view is also the basis of Christian social teaching: We are made in the image and likeness of God. As such, each of us has an innate dignity worthy of respect. As that dignity comes from God, every person has certain intrinsic rights to personal liberty, freedom of conscience, and basic well-being. The Declaration of Independence is a political statement developed by people who had a theistic worldview regarding man. That view was shaped by the teachings of the Christian sects to which they belonged.

A great danger to the nation today is the decline in religious faith and the exclusion of God from consideration in

the public affairs. As the permanence of American rights is rooted in the transcendental, a loss of belief in God leads to a loss of belief that the privileges bestowed by Him are intrinsic and unalienable. If God is no longer sovereign, the rights He endowed are no longer immutable. If these rights are to be preserved, then a belief in God must be sustained.

The Declaration continues, "That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed." Hence, the purpose of government is to provide the assurance that people can exercise those pre-existing rights; it does not grant them. Government exists for the people; its au-

thority resides in their will.

The state may ignore or violate these Godendowed rights. but it cannot revoke them. In a secular worldview, in contrast, there is no supernatural authority to which the state is subject. When belief in God is considered a private affair, unrelated to public matters, ultimate authority to define the rights of

the individual resides in the state. Those privileges are then provisional, for the state can rescind what it grants.

Although these innate rights are deemed unalienable, they are not unrestricted. Rather, they are subject to a higher natural law that was placed in human nature by the Creator and are to be regulated through one's conscience. This was done so that people would utilize their freedom in a morally and socially acceptable manner.

Indeed, America as a nation of liberty under law could not be sustained if the public was not inwardly governed by a higher imperative. Religion thus plays a significant role in support of governance by fostering public virtue among the citizenry so that they are capable of governing themselves with righteous norms.

The concluding sentence of the Declaration of Independence reads: "[W]ith a firm reliance on the protection of

The Catholic Church and Me

Time is passing quickly as we race toward eternity. Each of us has been created by God, endowed with free will, tasked to aid in the fulfillment of earthly Creation, and has the opportunity to eventually enter the kingdom of God.

It is not easy to fulfill God's expectations for us in today's world. We must be in the world to earn a living, to care for our families, to aid our neighbor, to bring our Faith into the public square. Yet, we must not be of the world,

accepting its materialism as a primary value, pursuing success at all costs, becoming inured to the sordidness, blasphemy, vulgarity and hedonism that surround us. The world is alluring. Even our first parents, who were placed in the Garden of Paradise, fell to the wiles of Satan.

To aid us in our earthly journey, we have been given the Church – one, holy, catholic, and apostolic – to help us see more clearly the distortions of the world, seek forgiveness for our failings, reorient ourselves to our purpose, and focus on the things that matter most.

But what is the Church? It is easy to think of it as the structures with which we are familiar – be it a grandiose cathedral or the local parish building where we attend Mass. We may think of its hierarchical format with the pope, cardinals, bishops and priests. But it is more than buildings and organization. It is the people in

our local parish community. And it is the assembly of All Believers – those presently in the world, those who preceded us and are now in heaven, and those in purgatory awaiting entrance into the kingdom.

The Church, in our daily experience, is Our Lord present in the Eucharist. It is Our Lady, St. Joseph, the Apostles, martyrs and saints. It is the elderly priest still hearing confessions and the impassioned, newly-ordained priest offering Mass, as well as missioners serving the poorest of the poor throughout the world. It is the monks and friars, mendicants and preachers, members of religious orders and diocesan priests. It is the religion teacher in a parish school and the mother listening to her children recite their evening prayers. It is the early morning weekday

Mass and the Pontifical High Mass; the Novos Order liturgy and the Traditional Latin service; the candle-lit Holy Thursday Procession, Eucharistic Adoration, and the Rosary said solemnly for a deceased friend. It is the sacristan, altar servers, lectors, the women who launder the altar cloths, the men who clean the church, the children who go to the parish school each morning and their parents who sacrifice to pay the tuition. It is the tabernacle, stained glass windows, the sanctuary lamp, the crib at Christmas, the statues draped in purple cloth during Lent,

the rose vestments on Laetare Sunday and the green ones of Ordinary Time. It is the couple exchanging vows at their wedding, the baby wailing as the baptismal water is poured over its head, the line of penitents outside a confessional, the children in their finest clothes receiving their First Communion, the hospital chaplain giving last rights to a dying man. It is the uplifting sermon and the dozeproducing one, the person with a misplaced vocation and one with a true religious calling. It is the brothers, contemplative nuns, sisters in public ministry, deacons, and consecrated men and women of every type who labor in schools, colleges, hospitals, homes for the aged, orphanages and charitable centers, carrying out missions of all types. It is the lay members of the third-orders of religious group, as well as the parishioners who serve the Church as members of the sodality, bible study group, arimatheans, con-

fraternity, RCIA team, Knights of Columbus, and the myriad ministerial groups. All of these vocations, activities, ministries, religious orders, structures, pastoral approaches and more constitute the Church. They are available to aid you and me on our journey through life.

In spite of its diversity, the Catholic Church is unified as one, holy, catholic, and apostolic.

The Church is *one* for it is united under its spiritual head, Jesus Christ, who came to reconcile all humanity through His Death and Resurrection. There is a single, unchanging deposit of faith found in Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition, which has been preserved, taught, defended, and handed on by the apostles through their successors,

divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor." What was intended by the expression "sacred Honor"? In Colonial America, honor referred to traits of character of the individual. It defined a person's sense of self-worth, his personal qualities and self-esteem. It meant living a life with integrity, guided by an internalized set of moral standards, in accordance with the natural and revealed laws. It was in effect the core of his identity.

It was their sacred honor which they pledged to support an idea – that there are certain unalienable rights bestowed by a Creator God – that led the 56 signers of the Declaration to make great sacrifices to establish this nation. In asserting that the 13 united colonies were free and independent, they became traitors to England, the country of which they were subjects. If the Revolution failed, many, if not all, would likely have been hanged and their property forfeited to the Crown. As it was, many of them suffered greatly, both during and after the Revolution. Yet, not one defected or recanted on his pledge.

This is part of the legacy that we have received from the nation's founders and which has been added to by generations of Americans who have toiled, contributed to and sacrificed for this country. This heritage is often reflected in the spirit of the nation, and expressed as a pride in its history, traditions, symbols, and achievements, and in the genius of its people. Through these elements of culture, one often develops feelings of allegiance to the country.

This affection for the nation is patriotism. A healthy loyalty to the nation is not an uncritical commitment to its every aspect, but rather demands recognition of the country's failings and shortcomings and inspires efforts to improve them. Patriotism is a commitment to the ideals upon which the nation was founded and to what it can be.

On this Fourth of July, enjoy the parades, flags, music, firework displays, and family gatherings. But also recall the values upon which this country was founded – ideals such as freedom, equality, human dignity, justice. And where the nation has fallen short, commit yourself on your sacred honor to live your life according to those values. One patriot may not change the country, but the country will not change until there is a first patriot.

and occasionally added to by popes speaking *ex cathedra* under the guidance and protection from error of the Holy Spirit.

The Church is *holy* because it is centered on God, established as Our Lord's agent for the sanctification of all Peoples. Through the ministry of the Church and the power of the Holy Spirit, our Lord pours forth abundant graces to all who seek and accept them through the sacraments, teaching, prayer, worship, and good works.

The Church is *catholic*, in that Christ is universally present in the Church, which He has commissioned to evangelize the world. The Church is for all times and all people, past, present and future. We here on earth, the Church militant, are united to the Church triumphant in heaven and the Church suffering in purgatory.

The Church is *apostolic*. Christ founded the Church and entrusted His authority to St. Peter, the apostles and their successors, saying, "I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven". This authority has been handed down through the Sacrament of Holy Orders from bishop to bishop, and through them to priests.

These four attributes or marks define what is termed the universal or spiritual church. It is the assembly of all Believers in all times under the kingship of Christ. Unfortunately, the members on earth – both lay and consecrated -- are imperfect human beings with free will and, like our first parents, can fall to the temptations of the world. The earthly, local church to which we belong, though endowed with spiritual gifts, is present in the flawed world.

Each of us is called to holiness and, by God's grace, we can attain it. If I fall, however, to the seduction of the world, accept its material values as supreme, stop practicing my religion or even give up the Faith, who will save me? The pope who leads a flock of 1.2 billion people? The bishop who never heard of me? My pastor – although he among the ordained clergy is most concerned about my salvation – who must soon return to the myriad duties of running a parish with hundreds and perhaps thousands of souls? Ultimately, I, and only I, am responsible for my salvation. The Church is here to help me, but the path I take whether to heaven or to hell is mine to choose.

Fr. McGivney to be Beatified

Fr. Michael McGivney will be beatified on October 31, the Congregation for the Causes of Saints announced on July 20. A miracle credited to the intercession of McGivney was approved by the Vatican and announced by Pope Francis on May 27. A child who was diagnosed as terminally ill in the womb was miraculously healed following prayers for the intercession of Fr. McGivney.

Beatification, being declared "blessed" by the Church, is the final step of recognition before a person can be declared a saint. Fr. McGivney will become the fourth U.S.-born man to be beatified, joining Bl. Stanley Rother, Bl. James Miller, and Bl. Solanus Casey. While the Church has recognized three women born in the United States as saints--St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, St. Katharine Drexel, and St. Kateri Tekawitha--there have been no U.S.-born canonized men.
